


As you get older, your health concerns may change, which can in turn raise questions about ageing and what that means for you. We have many titles in the library collection that may assist you in




answering those questions or just giving you a giggle about the whole process. Whether you're wanting to know more about physical activity, exercising, mental health or maybe you've got

Home Assist Program

The Gawler Home Assist Program is a Council service that aims to keep people living independently in their own home for longer. This is achieved through the provision of subsidised services that aim to help with tasks that people are no longer able to do on their own. This may include assistance with cleaning, gardening, home maintenance tasks, the installation of minor home modifications (such as rails and ramps), assistance to get out and about in the community or friendly in-home visiting. Home Assist services are available to Council residents aged 65 years or older with an appropriate **My Aged Care** referral. 
AUTHOR HIGHLIGHT


USING THE LIBRARY...

Using our self-loan station

Have you tried using our self-loan stations to borrow library items? We installed our first self-loan station at the old Gawler Library over a decade ago, and this was moved to the Evanston Gardens Library when the Gawler Library closed in 2017 for extensive building works. When it reopened in 2019 as part of the new Gawler Civic Centre, the Library had two brand-new self-loan stations that you can see when you visit us today. Our lovely old self-loan station at Evanston Gardens Library has finally seen its last day, and you will now find a new one over there, identical to the two at the Civic Centre Library.

They are there to assist our customers to '*grab & go*' with their reservations, to borrow items quickly and conveniently, to access their holds list, or to view their account. When customers choose this method it gives our library staff the opportunity to assist other customers who have more detailed queries. If you'd like to learn how to use the self-loan station, please ask one of our staff the next time you're in the library. We are always happy to show you more about how to get the most out of your library service. There are three ways to access the self-loan stations. You can scan your library card; manually type in your library card number; or scan the digital copy of your barcode if you have it stored in the Libraries SA app. This will bring up a screen where you can

choose your next step.



screen in a list with green ticks to show it has all been borrowed correctly.

Once you're done borrowing there are multiple options for your receipt at the bottom right-hand side of the screen. There are also options for different languages, including PIRATE!

There are three options. If you are borrowing, touch the green 'Borrow Items' icon and stack your items on the pad in front of the screen. The RFID (Radio Frequency IDentification) tags in all library items will be read by the self-loan station, and the titles should appear on the

TECH TIPS





Get Online Week is a yearly campaign from the Good Things Foundation to help promote safe and confident use of the internet and technology for everyone. Get Online Week for this year is 18-24 October 2021. The library will hold three workshops on October 20th at the Gawler Civic Centre Library, beginning at 10am. If you'd like more details or to book your spot, please ask the library staff next time you're visiting either of our locations.

Do you ever hear digital terminology that has you completely confused? We're going to help clear up some of these technological terms. Check out a few words we've explained for you below...

- **The Cloud** The cloud is an online storage space. Access to cloud services is via a web browser like Chrome or Edge or by using a dedicated app on your device.
- Podcast a recording of an audio program. Like listening to a live radio program, but with pause, replay and fast forward.
- WiFi Wi-Fi connects your device to the internet without the need for cables, as long as your device remains in range.
- App Short for application, these are the programs you find on computers. App is just another name for a computer program. Smartphones & tablets are types of computers, so everything they do needs a program or app. These are represented on your device by small images called icons.

WHAT'S IN A WORD?



The word 'boohai' has recently been added to the Oxford English Dictionary and got us to thinking about words about places. It sees colloquial use in New Zealand and occasionally in Australia.

Boohai: A remote rural place or district; 'the sticks'. Frequently in "up the boohai": in a very remote or out of the way place; (figurative) completely astray, altogether wrong; in a hopeless condition.

Perhaps it's a bit like

Woop Woop: a remote locations, middle of nowhere, or 'beyond the black stump'.

A very old word, and no longer in use, is a place you don't want to go

Wastingstead: A devastated place

While a very different sort of place is a

Halfpace: A landing in a stair which separates two flights of stairs.

Emu Bottom: painful stiffness of the glutes commonly experienced after the first lawn mowing of spring.

Following negotiations with the Kaurna Warra Pintyandi (Kaurna Language Group), the name **Tapa Pariara** has been agreed as a joint name for the river path. **Tapa** is a Kaurna word for path or track, **pari** is Kaurna for river and **pariara** is Kaurna for along the river, so

Tapa Pariara: path along the river

And these last words are all actual place names in Australia. The definitions however have been "inspired by the lyricism, humour and sheer idiocy bursting out" [of them]. They can be found in Dicky Beach and Alice Springs' book *Skewiff: the meaning of Australia*.


Goombungee: the pyscho dance of someone who has just walked into a spider's web.

Nuriootpa: the feeling of loss and disappointment when you come to the end of a good book and there's no sequel.

Seed Library - Spring Collection has arrived!

Spring has sprung! Well it did, and then it didn't, and now I'm patiently waiting for the sunshine-y days and cool nights to come back and stay! But my veggie

patch and garden seem to be doing well, and it is nice not having to water every day! It must be time to plant some seeds and let the season begin. We have our Spring seed collection available in the libraries and we have an abundance of seeds for you to add to your patch. Currently, we have the following seeds available; hollyhock, lamb's ear and four o'clock plant, freesia and swan plant, carrot, lettuce and rockmelon, cat grass, basil, parsley, and thyme. Come to the

library and collect some seeds, a limit of 3 packs per person applies, and we ask that you donate some seed back to the library after harvest, to ensure we can keep the seed library running in the future.

This exhibition is an innovative photographic project of 25 striking and thought provoking images; not a project of war itself, but a philosophical exploration of consequences of human conflict, of legacies that persist long after the guns fall silent. The exhibition brings together two separate groups of men with origins a century apart but who are united through a tragic conflict. One being the famed 'Diggers' of the Australian Imperial Force (AIF) who fought in Flanders in some of the worst battles of the Great War; the other, the personnel of the ongoing bomb disposal efforts on the same former battlefields today.

Chocolate witchy apples

You won't want to give these away to the trick or treaters! Better than toffee apples, you could get all your friends at the party to decorate their own.



makes 6

ingredients

- oil or butter, for greasing
- small apples, 6
- milk chocolate, 250g/8gz
- round sweets (candies), 12
- liquorice bootlaces
- ice cream cones, 6
- iewel-coloured sweets (optional)





tools

- Baking sheet
- * Baking parchment
- * Vegetable peeler ★ 6 wooden skewers
- or lolly (popsicle) sticks
- ★ Heatproof bowl
- * Medium pan
- * Wooden spoon

Lightly grease a baking sheet with oil or butter and line with a piece of baking parchment.



Peel the apples with a vegetable peeler and thoroughly dry them on kitchen paper. Press a wooden skewer or lolly stick into the core of each one. Adult supervision is required.



Put the chocolate in a Put the chocoluce heatproof bowl set over a pan of barely simmering water (take care not to let the water touch the base of the bowl). Leave to melt for about 5 minutes Remove the bowl from the pan and stir the chocolate gently with a wooden spoo . Adult supervision is required.




Tilt the bowl to collect 4 a deep pool of chocolate on one side of the bowl. Dip each apple in the chocolate, coating the outside completely (reserve any leftover chocolate in the bowl). Place each apple on the lined baking sheet. Leave for about 30 minutes, until the chocolate is almost set

One at a time, hold the apples by the sticks. Press two round sweets into the chocolate on each apple to make the witch's eves. Use a small piece of a liquorice bootlace to make a smile, and attach longer pieces to the top of the apple to make hair. Repeat with the other apples.

Use a little of the remaining melted chocolate to attach the cone to the top of the apple, for a hat. If you like, use a little more melted chocolate to attach jewelcoloured sweets to the cone, for decoration

KIDS CREATE

Have you ever made salt dough?

Here is the recipe to hours of creative fun.

- 2 glasses of plain flour
- 1 glass of salt
- water
- 1. Mix the flour and salt in a medium sized bowl and stir.
- 2. Add water, just a little at a time and stir some more.
- 3.Add just enough water to make the dough thick but not sticky.
- 4. Place the dough on a table and knead until it is soft and smooth, with no lumps.
- 5. If it's sticky, add a bit more flour.
- 6. If it's crumbly, add a bit more water.
- 7. Either make your figures on a baking tray or when you are done carefully transfer it to a tray.
- 8. Figures are baked at 100° Celsius. for 30 minutes for thin objects, and up to 60 minutes for round 3D shapes.
- 9. Figures should be take off the baking tray and placed carefully on the oven racks about halfway through.
- 10. After your figure has cooled, you can paint it if you wish.










Growing pains by Alison Alison McLennan& Illustrated by Melissa Johns


