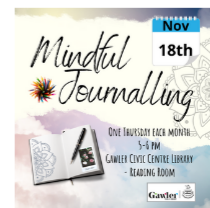

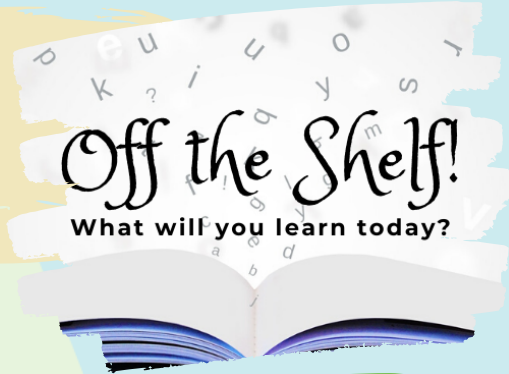

This can be emptied into your green waste bin or your own compost bin to turn into lovely compost for your gardens. GOLDEN RULES OF KERBSIDE RECYCLING 2

PUT IT IN LOOSE

Easy to recycle materials, accepted in most kerbside collections:

- ✓ Paper & cardboard
- ✓ Metal cans
- ✓ Cartons (fresh milk & juice)
- ✓ Glass jars & bottles
- ✓ Plastic containers

GOLDEN RULES OF KERBSIDE RECYCLING 3

LEAVE IT OUT

These cause problems at Material Recovery Facilities*

- ✗ Recyclables in plastic bags
- ✗ Soft Plastics
- ✗ Food
- ✗ Crockery
- ✗ Nappies
- ✗ Clothing/textiles
- ✗ Polystyrene
- ✗ CDs/DVDs/videos
- ✗ E-waste (e.g. batteries, mobiles)
- ✗ Window/drinkware glass

*Some councils have special recycling systems for some of these materials.

GOLDEN RULES OF KERBSIDE RECYCLING 4

CHECK LOCALLY

Recycling rules for other materials can vary between council areas. Search RecyclingNearYou or check directly with your council to find out what's accepted.

GOLDEN RULES OF KERBSIDE RECYCLING 5

DROP IT OFF

Items like mobile phones, coffee capsules, printer cartridges, computers, TVs, paint, soft plastics and beverage containers* can be recycled at drop off locations. Search RecyclingNearYou

*In stores with a Container Deposit Scheme

GOLDEN RULES OF KERBSIDE RECYCLING 6

IF IN DOUBT

Leave it out of the recycling bin! 'Wish-cycling' doesn't work. Putting the wrong thing in the wrong bin can ruin your good recycling efforts.

GOLDEN RULES OF KERBSIDE RECYCLING 7

BUY IT BACK

Unless you're buying packaging and products with recycled content like some plastic bottles and Planet Ark Paper, you're not fully recycling. Search Planet Ark's Recycled Products Directory.

World Children's Day is celebrated to promote international togetherness, awareness among children worldwide, and improving children's welfare.

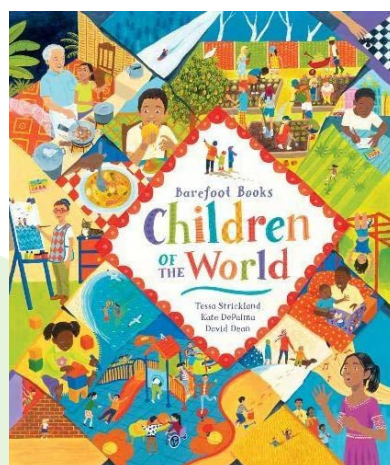
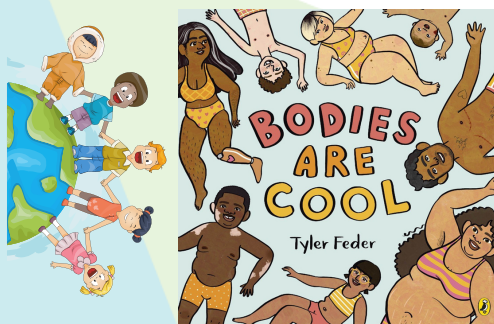
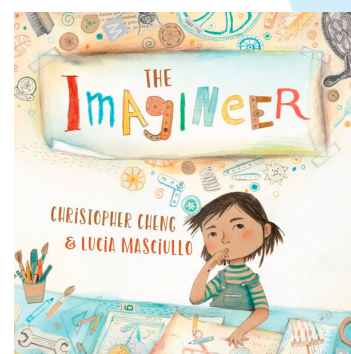

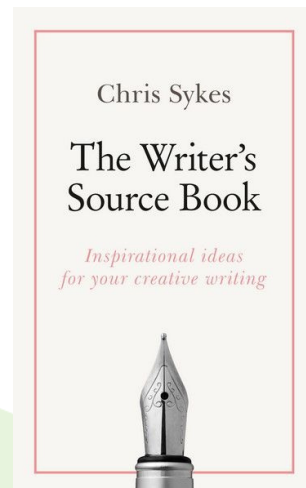
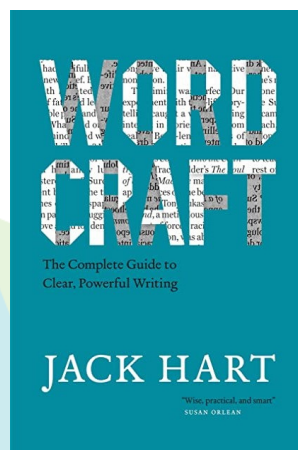
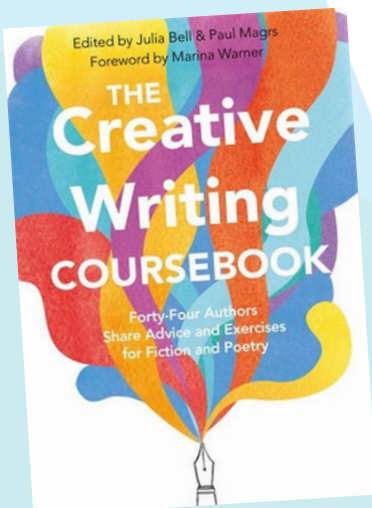
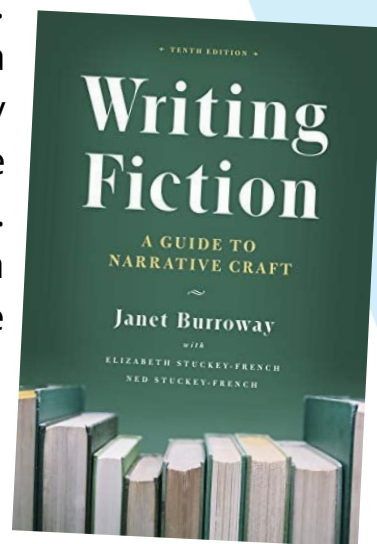
**National

Are you keen on trying your hand at writing? Maybe you're already a writer and would like the opportunity to flex your creative muscles. The **National Novel Writing Month** (*NaNoWriMo*) that first began in 1999, is an international event held every November for a fun, seat-of-your-pants approach to creative writing. Between the 1st and 30th of November participants work towards a goal of writing a 50,000-word novel. During the event in 2020 552,335 writers participated in the program, of which 97,439 were students and educators in the Young Writers Program. Abundant enthusiasm and determination to reach the goal is a must for participants, but there is a fantastic online community out there to join, full of encouragement with helpful tools at the ready. They changed their name to NaNoWriMo in 2013. NaNoWriMo is for anyone who has ever aspired to write a novel. For more information on this event please check out the link here... nanowrimo.org

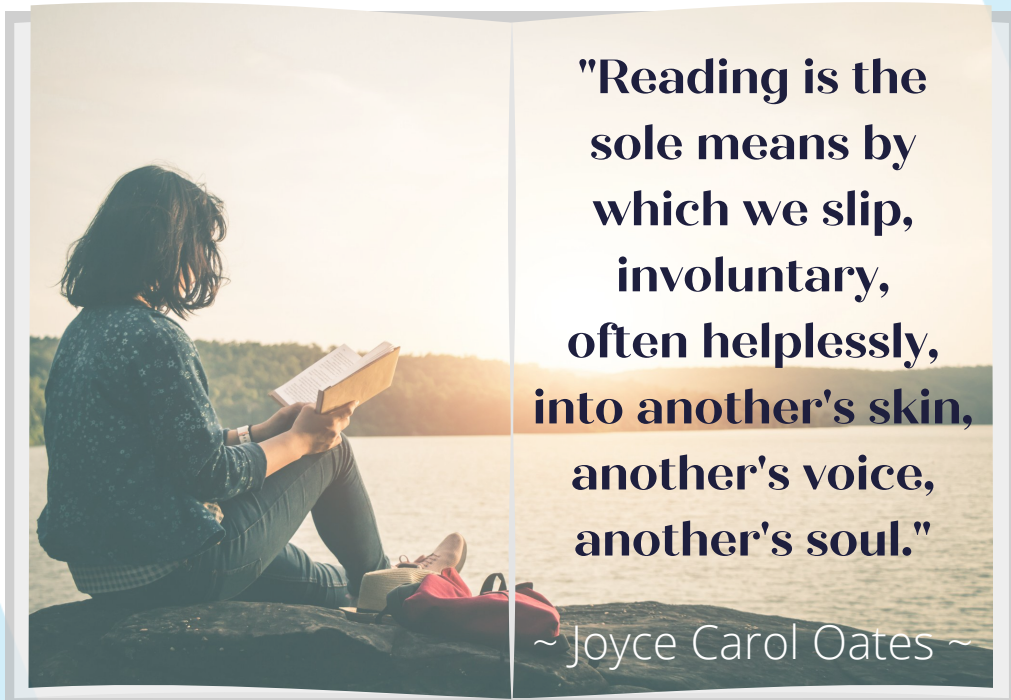

Perhaps you have noticed that the font (print) size isn't as clear as it used to be. It's shrunk! Maybe it's time to give our Large Print collection a try. We have a comprehensive range of titles at each of our libraries. You don't have to have poor eyesight to appreciate large print, either – it's very restful for tired eyes, too.

Remember, too, that if you can't find the title you'd like at either Gawler or Evanston Gardens, our friendly staff are only too happy to try to source it from another library, just for you. Libraries are for everyone. Come and have a good look around, and see if you can find something just for you.



TECH TIPS

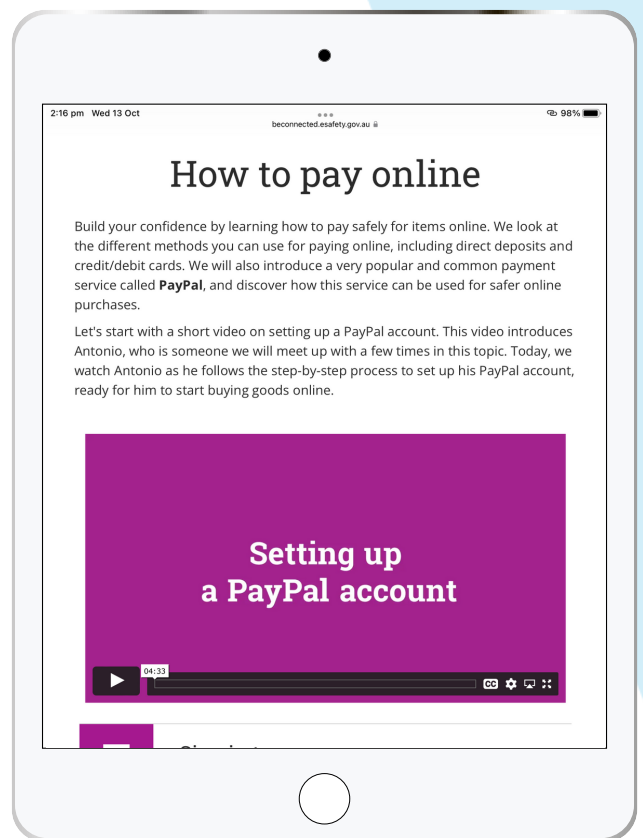


With Christmas just around the corner, our minds have started planning our Christmas lists and there are many fantastic deals, ideas and options available online. If you'd like to take advantage of the online stores, you'll need to learn about your options when it comes to paying for these goods

and services and how to go about keeping yourself safe whilst shopping. The Be Connected website has many courses that will build your confidence as you learn how to stay safe whether you're buying or selling online, the different ways you can pay, and how to keep your financial details safe from scammers. From PayPal, direct deposits and credit/debit cards you will learn about how these services can be used safely for online purchases. These courses will also show you what to look out for on websites to make sure you have found a legitimate and safe place to shop and what to do if you discover something has gone wrong. Many of our big department and well known retailers have trusted online shopping websites and apps where you can feel safe with your purchases.

Throughout all courses on the Be Connected website you'll find eSafety Tips to help you better understand the

technology you are learning about. If you'd like to learn more about the kinds of courses available from Be Connected so you can confidently do some Christmas shopping online this year, check out the link below or ask one of the library staff next time you're visiting either of our libraries.

eSafety Tip

Only enter your credit card, debit card or banking details into a trusted website that has a **padlock** and **https://** in the address bar. These show that the website connection is encrypted, so that your data is protected when communicating with the website.

We also recommend you keep a record of your online purchases somewhere handy, and check your credit card and bank statements to make sure there are no additional charges or unexpected amounts being debited.

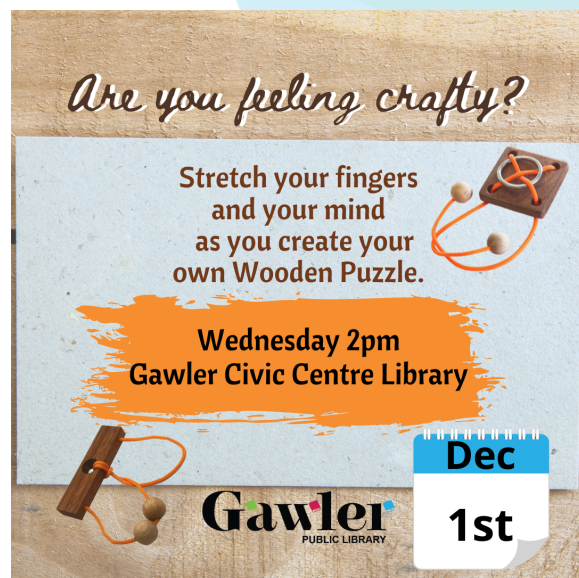
Bumfuzzle : confused, perplexed, flustered.

Taradiddle : a small lie or fib, nonsense.

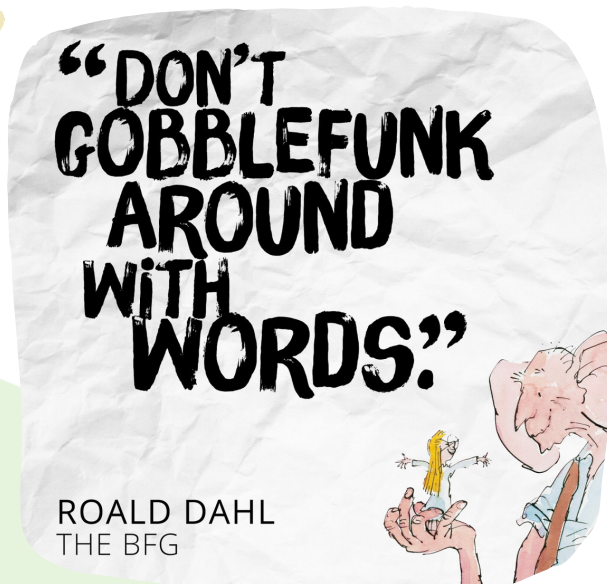
Bafflegab : deliberately obscure language employed in official documents.

GAWLER CULTURAL HERITAGE COLLECTION

When handling paper, care and common sense can help to prevent damage. To minimise handling consider creating digital copies of your item and carefully storing the original.

When handling paper items cotton or surgical gloves are recommended. Do not use gloves that have rough pads, powder, or dirt on or in them.



Due to their delicate condition, some individual paper items are best handled with freshly cleaned and well-dried hands. The oils on our hands build up quickly so we recommend you only handle a few paper items at a time before washing and drying your hands again.

At the Cultural Heritage Centre our wonderful volunteers are currently rehousing historic paper documents. They are placed into Polypropylene sleeves, with acid-free card as support. These are durable and transparent sleeves. They come in a great variety of sizes and are pH neutral and will protect a range of documents, papers, or images. Once they are in their sleeves they are placed in slipcase albums for easy and safe viewing.

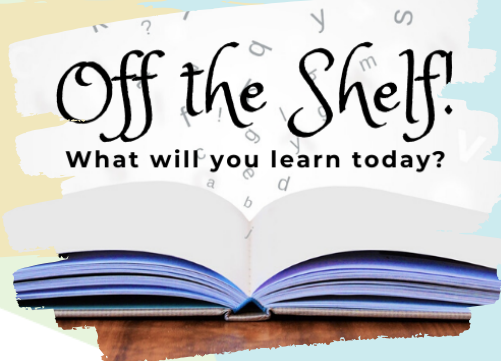

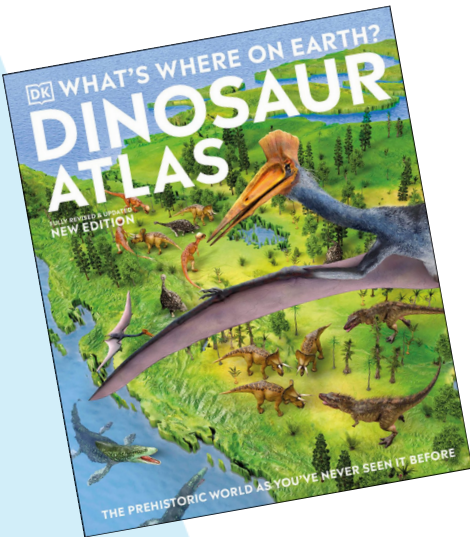


Do you have a dinosaur fan in your house?

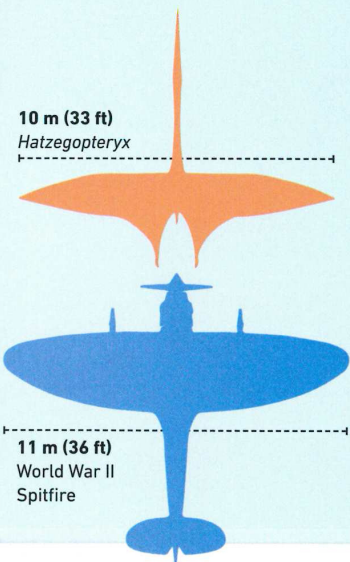

Wingspan

Hatzegopteryx had a wingspan about equal to that of a small plane. Large ridges on its wing bones, which mark the points where muscles attached, show that the muscles were huge and powerful.



Bone-breaker

Tyrannosaurus was the strongest biting organism to ever live on land. Its long, banana-shaped teeth and formidable jaws could shatter the bones of its prey, then inflict enough damage to break up a carcass into bite-sized pieces.



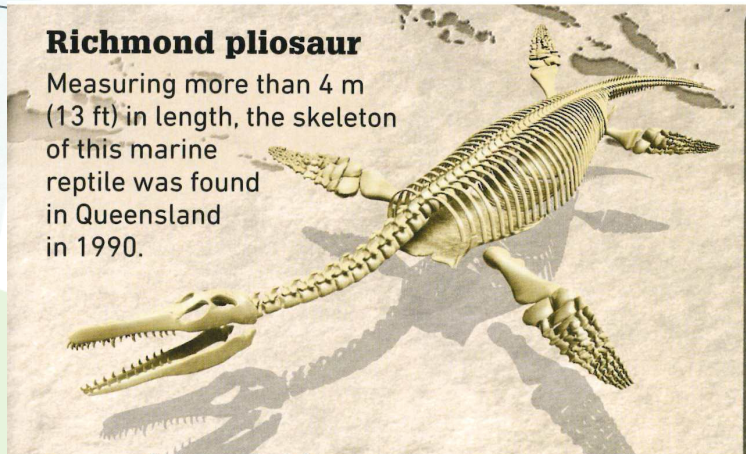
Eagle eyes

Similar to a modern-day eagle, Tyrannosaurus had exceptional vision. This dinosaur could see a long way in front, giving it the advantage when attacking prey.

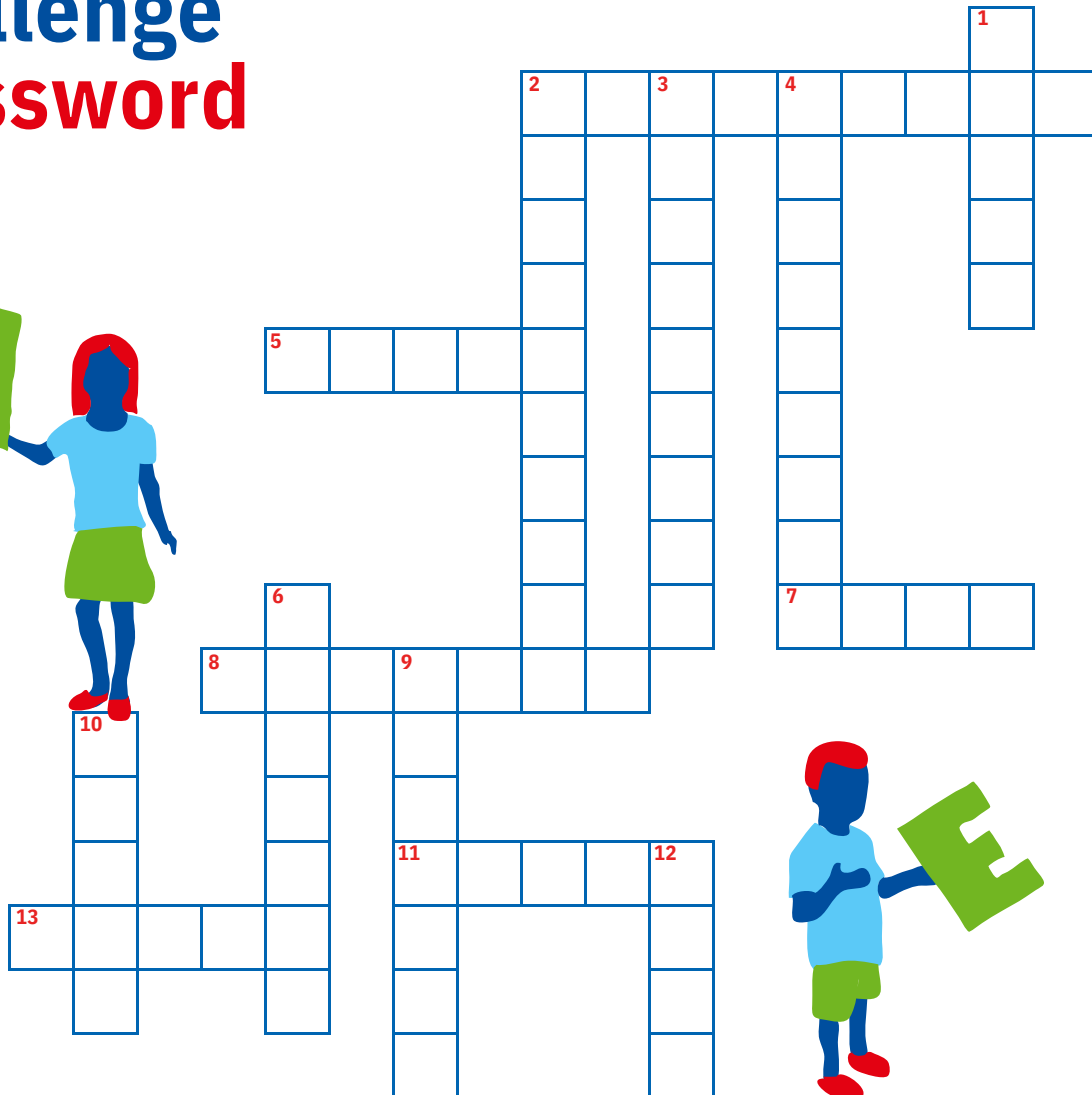
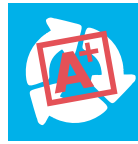


Richmond pliosaur

KIDS CREATE



With weather warming up and summer fruits coming into season, you may want to get creative in the kitchen with this smoothie bowl. Yummmm!



Recipe from
Green Kids Cook
by Jenny Chandler

SUPER-COOL SMOOTHIE BOWL

This is basically a smoothie thickened with a few grains or seeds, such as oats, chia or flax. These don't really add flavour, but make the smoothie both filling and loaded with slow-release energy to keep you going until lunchtime.

MAKES 4 SERVINGS

- 2 apples/pears, or 1 of each
- 3 pitted dates or dried apricots
- 3 tbsp plain yogurt (cow's/sheep's/goat's milk or maybe a nut or soy yogurt – the choice is yours)
- 300g/3 cups mixed berries, fresh or frozen (it's worth picking and stashing plenty of wild blackberries in the freezer for this one)
- 2 tbsp rolled oats, chia or flax seeds

TOPPING

- any mix of toasted nuts/seeds and fresh fruit
- we used:
 - 100g/¾ cup blueberries
 - 1 kiwi fruit, peeled and sliced
 - a handful of Granola (see page 18)
 - 2 tbsp toasted coconut chips
 - edible flowers (see pages 138–9)

- 1 Quarter the apples or pears, leaving the skins on, and remove the cores.
- 2 Roughly chop the dates or apricots.
- 3 Place the yogurt in a blender with the prepared fruit, berries and oats/seeds. Put the lid on and give everything a whizz. The mixture will loosen as the fruit breaks up, releasing its juice.
- 4 Check the texture – it should be just spoonable, like a thin yogurt, as it will thicken when the oats/seeds absorb some of the moisture and swell up. Add a couple of tablespoons of water if the smoothie is very thick.
- 5 Pour the smoothie into individual bowls and then arrange your toppings on the surface.

Try adding 3 tbsp cooked chickpeas or beans (such as cannellini, adzuki or butter beans) instead of the oats or seeds. Yes, it sounds bonkers, but the pulses will make your mixture velvety-smooth and I bet nobody will guess what the mystery ingredient is.
