Whether you want to grow them, display them, learn more about them, use them to convey messages, or to create homemade remedies, flowers have long since been an important hobby for many.




The Gawler Libraries have many titles which you might find interesting and are full of the wide variety of ways you can use flowers both native to Australia and from around the world.



International Women's Day



As Autumn arrives and the landscape around us begins to change why not take advantage of the photographic opportunities whilst you rediscover our Gawler walking trails?



ARTIST S P THOMAS READETT

As part of the 2023 Gawler Fringe, Tom joined us as Artist in Residence and created this amazing artwork that remains on display in the Gawler Civic Centre. His practice spans drawing, painting, video, music, advocacy and education. Thomas Readett is an established artist and a Ngarrindjeri man who was born and raised on Kaurna Country.

In this work, Tom explores the real-life experience of being a First Nations person and tracing back family histories. The removal of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples from communities has left holes in families both literally and emotionally. These displacements leave younger generations to piece together these lost histories, making it hard to fully understand their own story. The images depicted in Readett's work are fractured and displaced like his Grandma's history which he is currently tracing.

Tom uses the iconography of popular video game Tetris. He uses the meaning of this pop culture reference of pieces falling into place and connecting to win the game. In the game you attach multiple pieces of the same colour, in this work the pieces are all in greys, meaning these histories may never line up and are much harder to "fit into place".

There are thousands of publishing opportunities for short form writers, both online and in print.

If you want to get your poems, stories and essays published in journals and magazines, here are my top five submission tips.

- 1. Be organised Make a spreadsheet to keep track of your submissions. Include columns for the date of your submission, the title, publication or website and, of course, the outcome. Keep your spreadsheet up-to-date.
- 2. Create a Submittable account Submittable is an online submissions manager. It's easy to use, it's free, and it's a great source of information about current and future submission opportunities.
- 3. Submit your best writing Generally, an editor rejects work not because it's bad but because it doesn't fit the style of their publication. Having said that, don't submit anything that requires editing. Editors will spot an unfinished piece a mile away, and will reject it. It's not their job to polish your work.
- 4. Do your homework Read the publication to ensure your piece matches its style and feel. Check length requirements, as well as font and layout.
- 5. Be persistent Submitting your work for publication is a great way to support your own writing when you're not actually writing. Back yourself, and keep your writing journey moving forward.

They say the best time to plant a tree is twenty years ago, and the second best time is right now. So what are you waiting for? Your future as a published author may be just around the corner.

print, too, so is easy on the eyeballs.




Tonight's Dinner - Adam LIAW


As a public library service, we select a wide range of resources with consideration of our readers' culture, language, gender identity, and sexual orientation.

Reconciliation Action Plan

The Town of Gawler's vision for reconciliation is to build respect, understanding and dialogue between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people, with a focus on creating environments where meaningful interactions and relationships can occur.



This is the second Reconciliation Action Plan for the Town of Gawler. It builds on the significant work that has already been done and continues to pave the way for Gawler's continual growth into a place where reconciliation is alive and vibrant.

The Gawler RAP outlines practical actions that Council and its partners are taking to build strong relationships and enhanced respect with Aboriginal people from across the region. This Plan ensures that staff, council members, volunteers and members of the community are able to contribute to the reconciliation process.

The RAP framework is based on the three key areas of:

- Relationships
- Respect
- Opportunities

The RAP focuses on developing and strengthening positive relationships, acknowledging and respecting Aboriginal culture, and providing opportunities to ensure that Aboriginal people have the same opportunities as others in our community.

You can find a copy of the RAP to borrow from either of the libraries. Just ask the staff for assistance.


The RAP artwork - titled **Ngayidju Nhagu Ngallugu** ~ **Mine, Yours, Ours** - was produced by **Ngadli Art**. (pictured here with Mayor Redman)

The main centre circles reflect the RAP themes of relationships, respect and opportunities. The four corner sections represent historical truth-telling from various Aboriginal groups. The hills represent overcoming discrimination and racism and the journey we must go on together to eliminate this. The various symbols around the middle represent traditional and new ways of communicating to close the gap and build reconciliation. Imagery of the artwork is used throughout the document and the original canvas is on display at the Gawler Civic Centre.





GAWLER CULTURAL HERITAGE COLLECTION



It's the final curtain call for the award winning Gawler Heritage exhibition Behind the Scenes!

If you haven't seen it yet, you'll need to get in quick, as the team are preparing to close the gallery for a new exhibition premiering soon!

In late 2022 the Heritage Gallery exhibition 'Behind the Scenes' received a national Interpretation Australia Award in the category, Project - Indoors under \$75,000. This is the second Interpretation Australia award for the Cultural Heritage Centre. The judges commented that 'It is fun, delightful, lighthearted and joyous, and really has the local community at its heart'.

Tired of Anxiety is a step-by step guide for children on how to do the things that matter to them despite anxiety. Based on principles of Acceptance and Commitment Therapy (ACT), the book uses evidencebased clinical techniques and describes them in accessible, child-friendly ways to working positively with anxiety over the long term. By acknowledging that difficult thoughts and feelings are a normal part of being human, rather than something we must try to stamp down or wish away, the authors normalise the everyday struggles of anxious young people so that children can learn to make friends with their own important work of actually living and enjoying their lives.

- Gather together some vehicles and play your favourite car story.












