

Celebrated since 2009, World Chocolate Day, occurs around the world on 7th July.


Do you enjoy indulging in the occasional chocolate? Or is it an everyday treat? What is your favourite type?



Many people believe that cats were domesticated by the Egyptians, but studies have concluded that kitties adopted us well before then. One study estimated cats became domesticated 12,000 years ago in the Middle East. It is believed that all modern house cats descended from the Middle Eastern wildcat, Felis silvestris.

WEEKLY WIND DOWN

Winter is the perfect time to chill out on the couch and snuggle under a crocheted blanket - but even better than that - it's the perfect time to create a crocheted blanket. There are even more benefits to making crochet items than there is to snuggling under them.

In 2018 Dr. Pippa Burns and Dr. Rosemary Van Der Mer with the University of Wollongong Australia undertook a study of 8000 people about the benefits of crochet. They found that 90% of participants said that they felt calmer when crocheting and 82% said the hobby made them feel happier. A full 70% of respondents said that crochet improved their memory.

Mindfulness plays a big part in making crochet so relaxing, as crocheters pay attention to their stitch count, and the way the hook and yarn are working. Crochet has even been suggested as a form of therapy for people with dementia or obsessive compulsive disorder.

We have heaps of lovely items in our collection to get you started with crochet, but be warned - you might get hooked!


Fingerprint Analysis



Shade each of the boxes below with a pencil (a standard HB pencil will do).



Pick a hand and rub each finger in the boxes above to get some of the graphite from your pencil onto your finger tips. Place each finger on a small piece of sellotape and you should obtain a nice clear fingerprint! Do this for each finger and stick your sellotape fingerprints in the boxes below. Label each finger as being a 'loop', 'whorl' or 'arch'.



When you put sherbet on your tongue, the saliva in your mouth causes the citric acid crystals to dissolve. The citric acid reacts with the bicarbonate soda and produces carbon dioxide gas. The bubbles of carbon dioxide make the fizzy feeling on your tongue.

INGREDIENTS

- ½ teaspoon citric acid
- 1 tablespoon icing sugar
- 6 teaspoons jelly crystals (any flavour you like)
- ½ teaspoon baking soda

EQUIPMENT

- Bowls
- Measuring spoons
- teaspoon

EXPERIMENT

- 1. Measure ingredients into a small bowl using the correct measuring equipment.
- 2. Mix them well.
- 3. Taste a small amount at a time.

RESULTS: How does the mixture feel on your tongue? Is it too sweet? Too sour? Would different flavours be sweeter? React differently?

Our Game On workshops use a program called MakeCode

Arcade developed by Microsoft. You can find this freely available on the internet. There are many fantastic tutorials, ideas, videos, and lessons. The community that uses the website, uploads their own content to show what can be done and how to do it, are very encouraging.

There are tutorials for for the absolute beginner to those ready to try adding their code to some hardware, this is a great place to learn more about game design.

Another good online platform, also developed by Microsoft, is the Micro:bit website, which you can find here - https://makecode.microbit.org/

The games, tutorials, ideas and courses on there can be used with a microbit device, which is a great way to learn about robotics as well as coding. These little devices are a cheaper way to get started and are available to purchase online.

We have just completed the first Game On workshop series and have received fantastic feedback from our participants! Our next series of this same workshop will begin Thursday afternoon on the 4th August. If you have a budding game designer, you should definitely book them Participants are expected to attend the whole series of 6 weekly sessions between 4/8/22-8/9/22. Here are five good reasons to take children to the library today:

Regular library visits inevitably lead to more reading. And reading is brain food!

Research shows that reading actually aids in brain development, especially in your child's first five years of life. When kids are read to, their brain cells are literally turned on, and existing links among brain cells are strengthened and new cell links are formed.

Reading is also one of the best activities to provide the foundational language and literacy skills your child needs to succeed. And let's not forget how reading aloud connects us -- reader and listener -- in a very intimate way. When we read to aloud to kids, we send them this message: You are important. This time is for you.

When you visit the library, you can expose your children to more books and magazines than you can afford to buy.

Sure, you can take your kids to the children's section of a nearby bookstore but at the library, you can haul out as much as you can carry, turn your books back in as soon as they're read, and take home a whole new pile.

Further, the "casual discovery" nature of a library -- browsing without pressure to buy -- allows kids to be serendipitous. There's no predicting what might catch their fancy, but, whatever it is, they can "test drive" it at low risk.

Your local children's librarian can recommend books that you may not know of or think to suggest, broadening their tastes and expanding their minds and vocabularies.

Library time is active, not passive. Today's youngest library patrons engage -- with books and magazines, with librarians, and with other kids. Libraries offer regular children's programs that make stories come to life. (Think puppets, crafts, and animated storytellers.)

Owning a library card teaches kids responsibility.

As card-carrying library patrons, young kids learn about treating with care things that belong to others. When a kid checks out books in his own name, he feels trustworthy.




