Meet Sue...


She's worked at the Gawler Library since late October 2021 and is the Programs


Dinner with a difference




















MEET THE LOCALS

Norman Lindsay's birthday falls on 22nd February, originally born in 1879. An Australian artist and author from Melbourne, he accomplished many his life: things in art critic. autobiographer/memoirist, cartoonist, children's illustrator, novelist. painter, and political cartoonist. To escape the horrors of war, he put his mind to writing the very popular children's story; 'The Magic Pudding'. Did you read this story in your childhood or maybe as an adult?



Norman's life was not without controversy, with his views and the subject matter of his works at odds with other influential figures of his day. But he was a great influence on culture Australian during the early half of the 20th Century. To find out more about Norman Lindsay head to this link





HOW DOES THAT WORK?

Have you seen the large black or orange crates in either of our libraries? These are our courier system crates. Black crates belong to the statewide network and the orange crates are our own Gawler Library courier system.

COURIER

Whenever you request anything from a different library than the one you usually use, they will use this courier system to get where you want them. As you can imagine, it is a massive undertaking and requires a lot of clever logistical planning to have the network request system running smoothly.

Over the last financial year this courier system has moved almost 3 million items throughout the state, in over 250,000 black crates! We have also lessened our carbon footprint across the state by switching from single-use plastic cable ties to reusable ties when securing the crates during transport.

The new items that appear on our library shelves also find their way to us through this courier system and this makes up hundreds of items across SA each week!

If y<mark>ou'</mark>re ever curious abo<mark>ut the c</mark>rates ask the



staff member on duty to show you. We love any excuse to talk about our job!



How to return your

LIBRARY HOW-TO

Here at the Gave einer is, we have three ways you can return your items.

- Inside the Evanston Gardens library during opening hours is the returns box through the square opening in the top of the front desk.
- 2. At the Gawler Civic Centre library during opening hours, the returns chute is available on the stone wall facing the café area.
- 3. Outside of our opening hours, you can use the locked after hours chute available from the High Street entrance of the Gawler Civic Centre library. Just follow the instructions on the chute.

Otherwise most items can be returned to any public library in South Australia and will be sent by courier to wherever they are required next.




GAWLER CULTURAL HERITAGE COLLECTION

Damage occurs due to poor storage, handling, or display practices. Common forms of damage include tears, creases, folds, insect damage, fading, foxing and cup rings. When handling your documents please keep your beverages away from your work, no matter how careful you are, accidents can do irreversible damage.

The damage of paper items can help tell its story, a well-read book or a cherished love letter often show signs of wear, where as a book purchased and never read will not.



The key is to support the damaged document and to not course anymore harm. By handling and storing the items as outlined in Caring for your paper items Part 1 and 2 you will be well on the way to protecting your cherished historical documents.

The Gawler Heritage Collections contains paper items, which appear to be in fair condition however, due to their age we always treat them as fragile, be safe rather than sorry! If you have specific questions on how to care for your paper items we are happy to help, just contact the Cultural Heritage Centre.

CLEVER KIDS

Dragon Egg

With this spell, an ordinary chicken's egg can be transformed into something strange and colourful. What manner of creature might hatch from an egg like this? It must be something mystical...

YOU WILL NEED

Raw egg White vinegar Clear jar (with an opening much wider than the egg itself) Food colouring



1 Carefully place an ordinary chicken egg inside a jar.

R Cover the egg with vinegar and a few drops of food colouring. Leave for about three days. Have you got a few extra days at home, and looking for something entertaining to do? How about creating your own Dragon Egg? Try this simple experiment from "Potions Class: Science experiments for the magically minded". If it's as much fun as we think it will be, you might want to borrow the book! You'll find it at the library!

3 Pour away the vinegar and take out the egg.


Your egg should now be soft, bouncy – and colourful! But be careful, it can still break if you bounce it too hard!

What magical beast slumbers inside?

Did you see bubbles when you covered the egg with the vinegar? That's because the shell of the egg reacts with the acid in the vinegar to make carbon dioxide. The hard outer shell dissolves over time, leaving just the membrane underneath. Your egg will also have become larger as it absorbed the vinegar (and food colouring) through this membrane.


