King's Birthday

So May the 6th has come and gone, and we have now crowned a new King. Charles Philip Arthur George was born on the 14th of November 1948 at Buckingham Palace, London, United Kingdom to the then Princess Elizabeth and Philip Mountbatten. Charles was the longest-serving heir apparent and Prince of Wales in British history. He became the heir presumptive at three years old when his mother acceded the throne in 1952, and as the oldest person to accede to the British throne, he's now heading into a different stage of his life at 74 years old!

So, if his birthday is in November, why do we get a public holiday in June (in SA)? Before Queen Elizabeth died, she also had two birthdays. Her actual birthday was the 21st of April and the official birthday celebrations were held on the second Saturday in June. The large public celebration with parade is known as the Trooping the Colour and it really all came down to the weather.

King George II started this tradition during his reign in 1748. His birthday fell in November, and it was felt that it was too cold (in the Northern Hemisphere) for a celebratory parade for his birthday. So, he instead tied his birthday celebrations in with the annual Trooping the Colour military parade. Unfortunately for those in the UK it is not a public holiday, but here in Australia we have a day off (date changes depending on state decision) to observe this occasion. So, whether you're a monarchist or republican, we hope you enjoy your day off in June.

Plastic Free July is a key initiative of the Plastic Free Foundation that is working towards their vision of seeing a world free of plastic waste. From humble beginnings in 2011, the award-winning Plastic Free July campaign is the result of years of hard work.

It was started by Rebecca Prince-Ruiz (the founder of the Plastic Free Foundation) and a small team in local government in Western Australia, and is now one of the most influential environmental campaigns in the world. Millions of people across the globe take part every year, with many committing to reducing plastic pollution far beyond the month of July.


Plastic Free July participants:

- reduce their household waste and recycling by 15kg per person per year (3.5% less waste)
- globally they reduced 2.1 billion tonnes of waste and recycling including 300 million kgs of plastic consumption

 has reduced global demand by
 2.3% of all bottled water, 3.1% of
 all fruit and vegetable packaging,
 4.0% of all plastic straws







It could be something as small as making sure you have a fun activity planned for each week, a new book to read (from the library *obviously*), catch up with a friend at the local park, or a cup of tea at the start of each day before you head into the fray. AUTHOR HIGHLIGHT



MOIKUS ZUSOK

An Australian author, born in 1975, he is the author of five books, including the international bestseller, *The Book Thief* which was adapted into a film in 2013 starring Sophie Nélisse, Geoffrey Rush and Emily Watson. Markus's books straddle the line between young adult and adult fiction, so the stories will appeal to many readers.

Twenty-one years ago Markus published the novel *I am the Messenger*. This has recently been adapted into a miniseries by the ABC. Markus decided to go back and re-read the original book as preparation for his role as executive producer. He was adamant the adaptation was produced in Australia as he felt these stories should be made where the ideas originated and the story was set. Why not rediscover his other works? Truth-telling: the act of relating the facts of a situation, exclusive of any embellishment or dilution applied as justification for past actions.


While the People's Choice Word of the Year 2022 is




ANNETTE'S REVIEWS

National Reconciliation Week is recognised across Australia each year between 27 May and 3 June. The theme for NRW 2023 is Be a Voice for Generations. It encourages all Australians to be a voice for reconciliation in tangible ways in our everyday lives – where we live, work and socialise. NRW occurs between two significant dates in Australia's reconciliation journey; the 1967 referendum and the historic Mabo decision.

27 May

Marks the anniversary of Australia's most successful referendum and a defining event in our nation's history. The 1967 referendum saw over 90 per cent of Australians vote to give the Commonwealth the power to make laws for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and recognise them in the national census.

3 June

Commemorates the High Court of Australia's landmark Mabo decision in 1992, which legally recognised that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples have a special relationship to the land - a relationship that existed prior to colonisation and still exists today. This recognition paved the way for land rights and Native Title.

NRW is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures and achievements and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.

COMMUNICATION IN GAWLER

EXHIBITION NOW OPEN!



The new Heritage Gallery exhibition 'Down the Line' explores the themes of communication and its role in building communities. The exhibition explores the impact of the postal service, the telegraph and the telephone on the Gawler community allowing them to stay connected to each other and the wider world.

View rare early colonial letters, telegraph equipment brought to South Australia by Charles Todd and a collection of funky antique phones. Make a call using the magneto telephone and try your hand at morse code with our telegraph equipment. Hear the voices of the women of the Gawler telephone exchange as they 'connect your call'.

This exhibition is an opportunity to understand more about the evolution of communication technologies that have been fundamental in keeping communities informed and connected.





OFF THE SHELF

Welcome to a world of wonders!




BOUNCYBALLS


You will need:


- 3 tbsp Clear Glue
- 1 tbsp Glitter
- Food coloring (optional)
- 1 tbsp Saline Solution (must contain Boric Acid)
- 1/4 tspn Bicarb Soda
- 2 spoons or craft sticks
- Bowl
- Cup



















- Measure 1 tablespoon of Saline Solution into your
- Add 1/4 teaspoon of Bicarb Soda to your bowl and stir well



IN YOUR CUP

- Measure 3 tablespoons of clear glue into your cup
- Measure 1 tablespoon of glitter into your cup
- Use a pop stick to stir your glitter glue

MAKING YOUR BALL

- Carefully pour a blob of glitter glue mix into the borax solution
- Gently move it around in the bowl
- Pick it up and fold it and roll it into a ball
- You can try shaping it with 2 measuring spoons
- If it is sticky, put the ball back into the bowl of saline solution and roll again

Please note that these balls won't stay bouncy forever, so enjoy them while they last!
