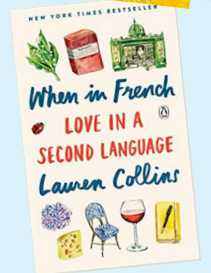
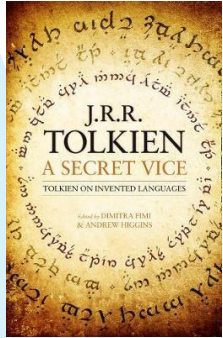
Did you enjoy our first **Borrow Bags** during August?

5 The 'hilarious' *Rosie Jones* (based on the true story of a houseboat of that name and its many owners) was written by a woman.

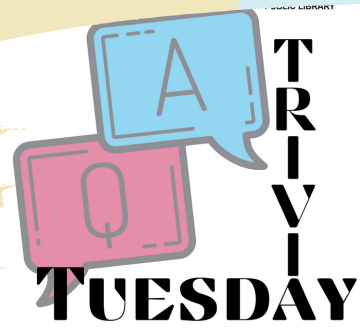

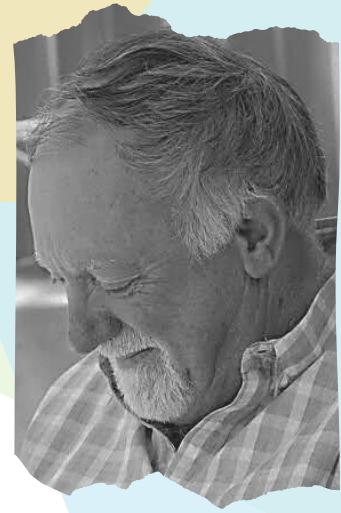

# TALK ABOUT TOWN..



This is a new addition for our newsletter.  
An opportunity for us to highlight our local creators. For September we've got a piece written by local poet, Jeff Guess.

*Yes, but is it Art?*

*'Pushing Up Daisies Exhibition' Gawler Civic Centre*



*Some time ago during the annual SALA month of art, I attended an exhibition with a group of 'art-minded' friends. The first exhibit, was an old classic Coke bottle with a small amount of water in the bottom, crown seal replaced and a slight mist on the inside glass. It was titled 'Breath' and was on sale for \$100. We were in some confusion and doubt about it. I suggested to the group that I would ask for some more information as to how we might approach the work. The curator was available but dismissive, and told us an understanding of Construction Art was seminal to an understanding of this particular exhibit.*

*The 'Pushing Up Daisies' art event in the Gawler Civic Centre has brought my above example into stark contrast and comparison. It has caused confusion, anger, dismissal, praise, adulation and kind words. However, the phrase that I have heard repeatedly is – 'Yes, but is it Art?' When I first encountered it my first reaction was – 'I am not certain at all at what I am looking at, experiencing or feeling'. Once – we 'knew' what art was. It was defined in our Western Canon. Now we have a plethora of 'artists' calling what they produce 'art'.*

*My purpose in writing about the current exhibition in Gawler is not to produce some kind of personal definition of art but approach it in a different fashion. When I asked the curator in my first example to help us 'approach' the piece she wasn't helpful. Much modern contemporary art is aided by background, explanation and exposition. Otherwise we become fearful and feel we are perhaps being fooled or made fun of.*

*In the 'Pushing Up Daisies Exhibition' help was at hand. No sooner had I looked over the exhibits I found there was a leaflet available: "Featuring eco-coffins and shrouds decorated by participants in the Eco-coffin Project. These powerful personal works of art and love raise questions about sustainable death and community awareness of natural burial." <https://www.gawler.sa.gov.au/about-gawler/events/pushing-up-daisies-eco-coffin-project-exhibition>*

*My first reaction was emotional. I saw it again, but for the first time. It was saturated in beauty, concern for the environment, love, creativity and an astonishing leap of imagination and above all – YES! It is art! Congratulations to the artists and others involved.*

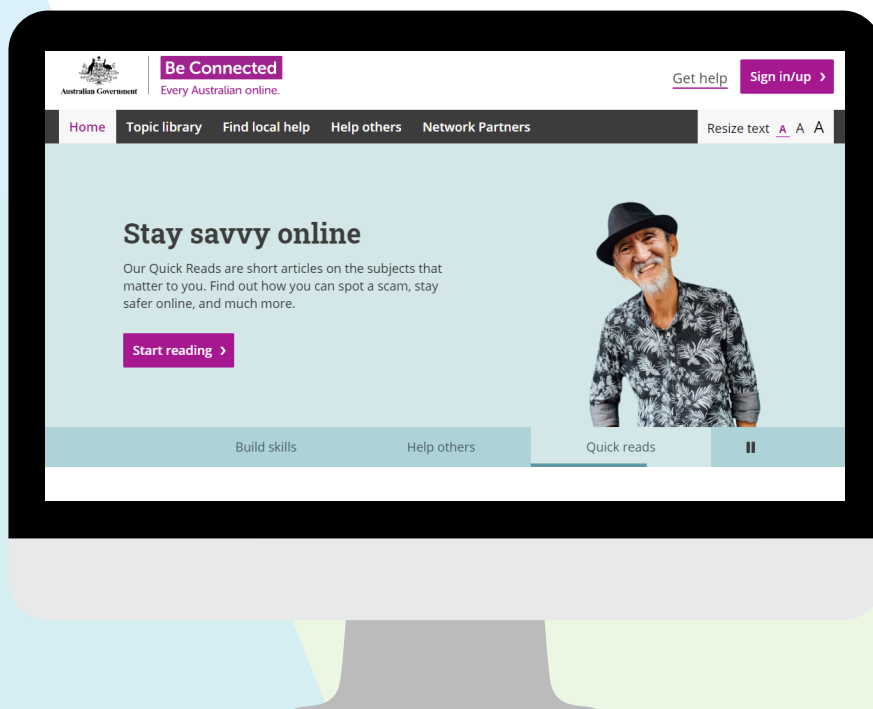

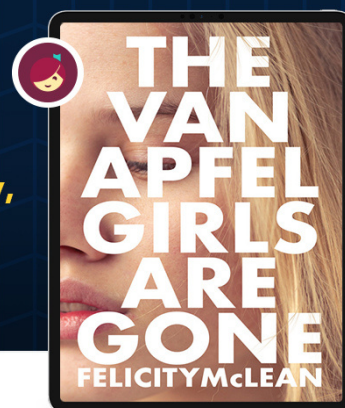

Staff are available to assist researchers.

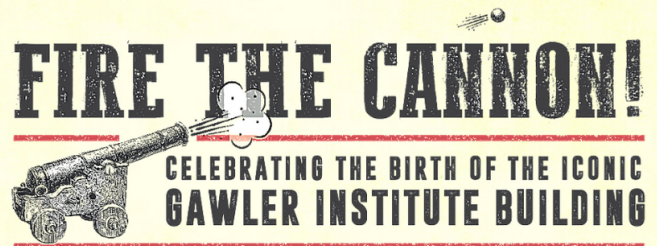

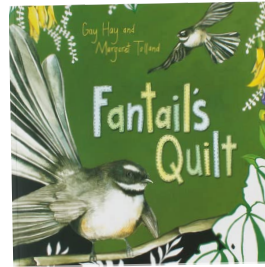
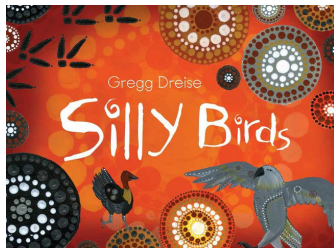
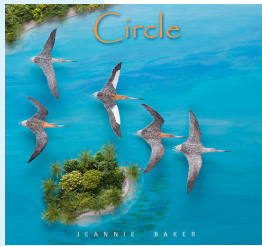
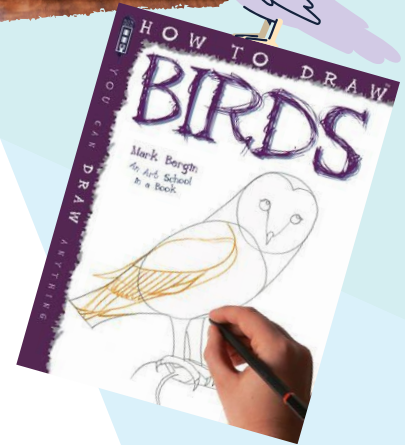
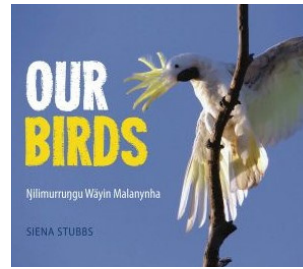
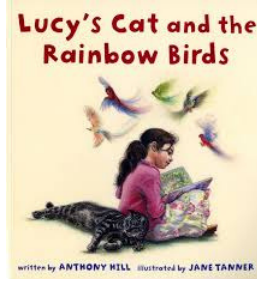
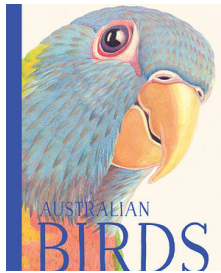
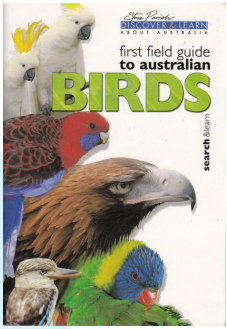


# OFF THE SHELF

Off the Shelf!  
What will you learn today?



Do you hear the birds around your place? Have you discovered any nests? Have you ever tried bird watching? Do you have a favourite? Here's a pile of books to find out more about your favourite birds.



## Decorate a tree for the birds 1

These pretty bird treats look great on the bare branches of a tree in winter. Watch to see how many different types of bird visit your tree.

- You will need:**
- \* 50gm bird seed
  - \* medium-sized mixing bowl
  - \* 50gm lard
  - \* saucepan
  - \* wooden spoon
  - \* star biscuit cutter
  - \* aluminium foil
  - \* pieces of raffia 20cm in length

### Birds in winter

Birds have several layers of fluffy feathers to trap heat and keep them warm in cold weather. Finding food can be more of a problem in winter, which is why it is a good idea to feed garden birds.



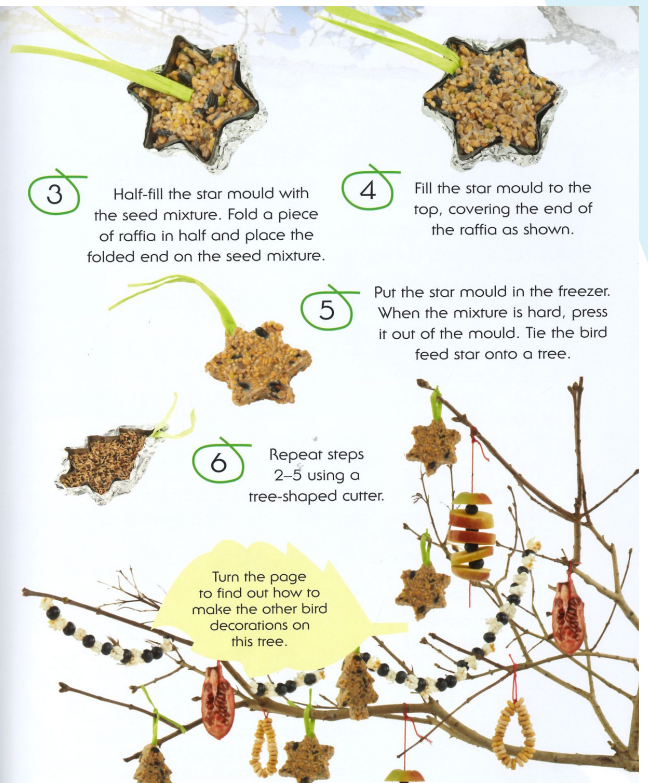

Pour the bird seed into the mixing bowl. Ask an adult to melt the lard in the saucepan. Leave it to cool for 5 minutes. Stir it into the seeds.

2



Wrap foil around the bottom and sides of the biscuit cutter, as shown.



3

Half-fill the star mould with the seed mixture. Fold a piece of raffia in half and place the folded end on the seed mixture.

4

Fill the star mould to the top, covering the end of the raffia as shown.

5

Put the star mould in the freezer. When the mixture is hard, press it out of the mould. Tie the bird feed star onto a tree.

6

Repeat steps 2-5 using a tree-shaped cutter.

5. Add wool mane or bridle.



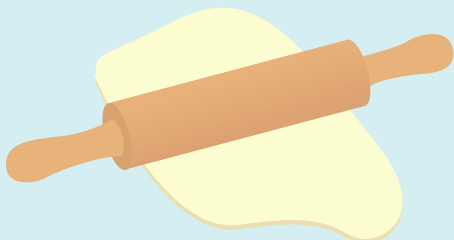
## Playdough Recipe

### You will need:

- 2 cups of flour
- 1 cup of salt
- 1 dessertspoon of cream of tartar
- 1 tablespoon of vegetable oil
- 2 cups of boiling water
- Food colouring (optional)
- Natural scents like lemon or cinnamon or lavender flowers (optional)

### What to do:

1. Mix dry ingredients in a bowl.
2. Make a well in the centre.
3. Add oil.
4. If using colouring, add to the hot water, then tip into the well.
5. Stir thoroughly, then leave to cool.
6. When cool enough to handle, turn onto bench (you may need to flour it) and knead until smooth.
7. Add sensory items if desired.
