TALK ABOUT TOWN...

This is a new addition for our newsletter. An opportunity for us to highlight our local creators. For November we have a piece written by local author, Judy Gillett-Ferguson, a retired educator who spent many years advising parents and teachers how to foster a love of reading and reading skills in children.





Leaning to Read - The Gift of a Lifetime. Being able to read is not a natural process for human beings as learning to speak is. We learn to speak instinctively if we are spoken to, but reading has to be learned. For some people this is more difficult than for others - like those who have some form of dyslexia. As competent readers, what we take for granted when we read are things such as: read only the black patterns on the page not the white ones in between, read from the top of the page and from left to right (not the case in languages like Arabic, Hebrew and Chinese who read from right to left.) We open the book with its opening on the right hand side not the left (as in some other languages). All these processes have to be learned and aren't at all instinctive. Some of the most precious gifts we can give children are the skills and delight in reading. This begins from birth when we talk, sing, recite nursery rhymes, tell oral stories and even read to infants and very young children. They soon learn that stories, poems and rhymes and being read to from books are associated with love, comfort, fun and excitement, and most importantly, with those nearest and most important to them.

Being read to often and in a relaxed environment instils in young children a recognition of books as a source of pleasure and later, information. They progress from picture books and those with rhyming texts they can learn by heart - Dr Seuss books are a classic example of these! This mimicking and repetition are important pre-reading skills. Coming into a library is an Aladdin's Cave for children where they can choose books that appeal to them and where often wonderful reading and story telling experiences are provided by library staff. At home, the Public Library, at Child Care, pre-school and at school, children benefit from these pre-reading experiences and a foundation for a love of reading has been laid for a lifetime! What a gift to give the children you love!



TECH TIPS



Once programmed they can be used to show the scanner a website, play a song or video, display instructive text or even map directions.


GAWLER HERITAGE COLLECTION

On display in the Reading Room

This aptly named calico dress, 'The Bunyip Dress' is currently on display in the Reading Room at the Gawler Civic Centre. Entry is gained through the Gawler Public Library during Library hours.

The Bunyip Newspaper that is printed on the dress dates from Friday, August 18, 1916. Our research has failed to uncover when the dress was made, why, or who wore it. It is possible that it was created by the Barnet family, to aid one of Gawler's many fundraising efforts for the Great War (WWI). The Barnets owned and operated the newspaper at the time and the family were extensively involved in all aspects of the community. Many thanks to Kay Boon for saving this dress from a 'pile of old rags' in the 1980's. Have you any hints or links to this dress? We would love to hear from you.





Why 'Fire the Cannon?'

The cannon on display as part of the Heritage Gallery's latest exhibition is the cannon that was fired on May 30th, 1870. It was fired to mark the arrival of the South Australian Governor Fergusson into Gawler and to celebrate the laying of the Foundation Stone of the Gawler Institute Building that occurred that same day. Dr William Home Popham owned the cannon at that time. He used the cannon from his home, Craiglea (directly behind the Gawler Civic Centre) to mark important events such as the arrival of the Duke of Edinburgh in 1867, the sixtieth anniversary of the reign of Queen Victoria in 1897 and when it was feared that the Russians were invading in 1888.

Dr Popham acquired the cannon prior to his arrival in Gawler in 1858 and it is believed to be one of the four 88 inch cannons that came to South Australia on HMS Buffalo in 1836. Come on in to the Heritage Gallery and see the cannon for yourself.




Arts on the Plains Art Exhibition -








Exam Tips

CLEVER KIDS - SCIENTISTS



Whether it is stinky or nice, smells are all made possible because of your nose sending signals to the brain. The sense of smell, comes from your olfactory system. Chemical molecules (smells) enter the nose and dissolve within a membrane called the olfactory epithelium. In humans, the olfactory epithelium is located about 7 cm inside the nose.

Identifying smells is your brain's way of telling you about your environment. Have you ever smelled your toast burning? In an instant, your brain interpreted the smell as a problem and you knew to check on your toast.

Here's an experiment to test your family's olfactory senses.

- 1. Find 5 10 household items such as:
- Onion
- lemon
- vanilla
- vinegar
- gum leaves / eucalyptus
- burnt wood or toast
- Lavender or flowers
- laundry powder
- 2. Wrap them up in a small piece of paper and poke some holes in the paper with a toothpick so that you can smell them.
- 3. Ask your family or friends to see if they can guess which each smell is. Were some smells edible and others not? Did some smell dangerous or comforting? Were some familiar and others unusual?
