





Staff at Gawler Public Library are working on establishing a Seed Library as part of the normal library collection and are seeking seed donations from members of the Gawler community. Once a start-up collection is established, seeds will be available from both library branches.

- help preserve rare, open-pollinated or heirloom seeds and encourage gardeners to save quality seeds that are suitable for the local growing area












# TALK ABOUT TOWN...

This is an opportunity for us to highlight our local creators. For February we have a special piece written by Allen Tiller about the history of the Gawler Institute Library.

#### James Beasley - Gawler Institute Librarian

James Beasley was the fifth Librarian, and Secretary, of the Gawler Institute Library. He had served as Librarian to the Institute for 43 years at the time of his death on 24 January









James Beasley was born near Ballarat in Victoria on 4 July 1859. Beasley came to Gawler in 1885 and worked as a draper's assistant for J & G Wilcox, and later for Sir Edward Lucas. In 1890, the then Institute Librarian, Otto Wehrstedt, resigned from his position, and Beasley was appointed to the role.

It has been said that Beasley loved his job and the books he cared for so much:

"That he was an encyclopedia of their contents and could always make selection on any subject searched for by an inquirer."

The front of the Institute Building was remodelled into the Memorial Building in 1931, the first substantial change to the building since its erection in 1870. Following the remodelling came a restructuring of the Institute Committee, from which Beasley was appointed the Honorary Secretary.

In Beasley's day, the library members had to pay a quarterly subscription fee to access library books. Beasley often voiced his opinion that libraries should be obtainable to the public for free. He called on the local council to municipalise the Institute Library. He called for the upkeep of the library and the purchase of books to be paid for through council rates, rather than subscription, as this would allow the public to access books and information, rather than just those in a privileged position who could afford to do so. Beasley was fundamental in founding the Gawler Starr-Bowkett Society. The society applied the principles of co-operation for the purpose of providing homes free of rent and interest. Beasley was a Freemason and was at one point Past Master of the Lodge of Fidelity in Gawler.

For several years James Beasley, his wife and children, and his mother, lived in the basement of the Institute, and two rooms on the ground floor. The rooms where Beasley lived are now the Gawler Cultural Heritage Centre and the Civic Centre staff workroom.






## DIGITAL LIBRARY


#### Knot A Scoubidou Key Ring

Scoubidou strings are colourful plastic cords, perfect for making your very own bracelets, necklaces or key rings. All it takes is a little time and practice.

#### You'll need:

- 2 different-coloured scoubidou strands
- a split ring that takes keys
- a medium-sized bead (match it with your scoubidou colours, if you can)






Step 1. Make a small loop in the middle of one strand and then tie the different coloured strand around the loop in a knot. This will be the loop you attach the split ring to.





Step 2. You now have four scoubidou strands, A and B in one colour, C and D in a second colour. Arrange the colours so that they are opposite each other in a cross.



Step 3. Make a loop in strand A and a loop in strand B as shown. Now thread strand C through loop A and strand D through loop B and pull tight. The knot should now look like a chequered square.




Step 4. Repeat step three, but this time make loops with strand C and strand D and then thread A and B through the loops you have made and tighten.

Continue your scoubidou, alternating the knots made in steps 3 and 4 until it is as long as you want. Leave a 6 cm length at the end of each strand. To add a bead, thread your bead over all four strands before making a final knot.

## **RUBBER BANDS**

his is the very first trick that I started performing for my friends when I was a kid. Really, this is an amazing trick and it has stood the test of time. It will look as though rubber bands can jump between your fingers in a blink of an eye.



Here's how you do the trick:

Take a rubber band and put it on your first two fingers (your index finger and your middle finger). This is the first position, and this is where the trick begins. Now, grab the rubber band with your palm facing you and stretch it out so that you can fit your four fingers inside the space created by the stretched rubber band (1). Close your four fingers and slowly and secretly rest the outstretched rubber band on the back of your fingernails (2).





Now when you open your fist, the magic will happen automatically, and the rubber band will appear to jump to your other two fingers (your ring finger and your pinkie). Keep in mind that you can do this again in reverse by stretching the rubber band out and placing your four fingers in again, resting the rubber band on your fingernails, and opening your fist, but you want to try to make the movement of closing your fingers inside the rubber band a secret. I like to do it like I'm adjusting the rubber band as I close my fist, when in reality, I have closed those four fingers into the gap and secretly rested the rubber band on the back of my fingernails.

And that is how you make a rubber band jump instantly between your fingers!







- 2. Place your sketch inside the cover of the book you would like to be seen reading and hand this to library staff.
