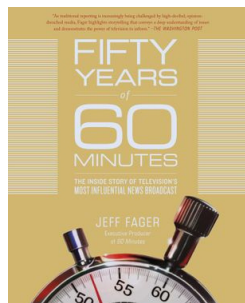
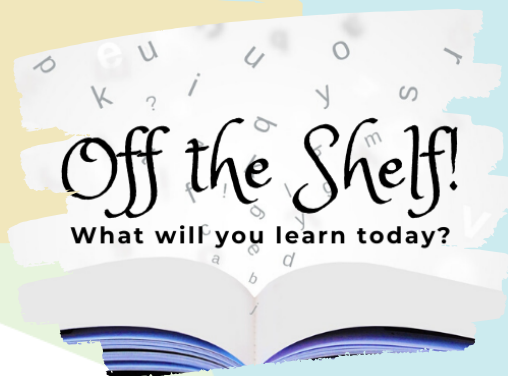

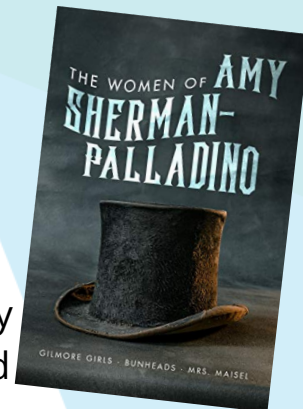
Did you enjoy our **Borrow Bags** during September?

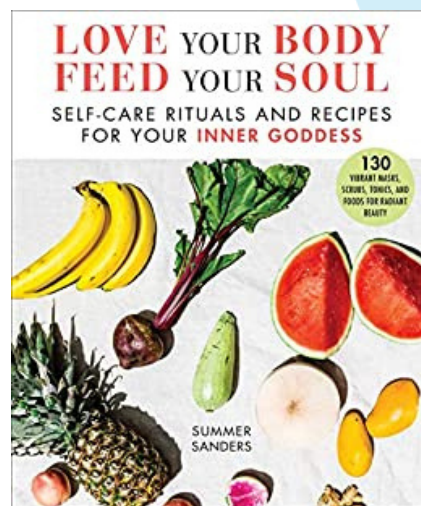
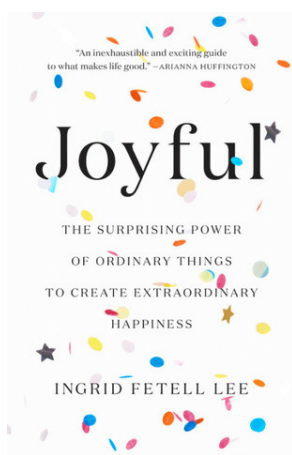
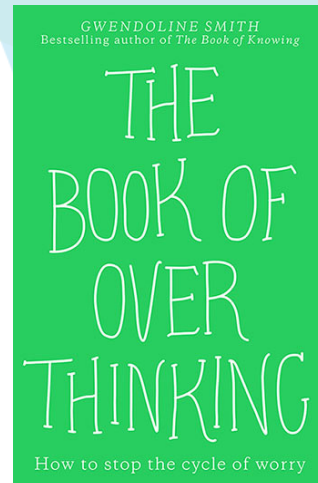
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WEEKLY WIND DOWN

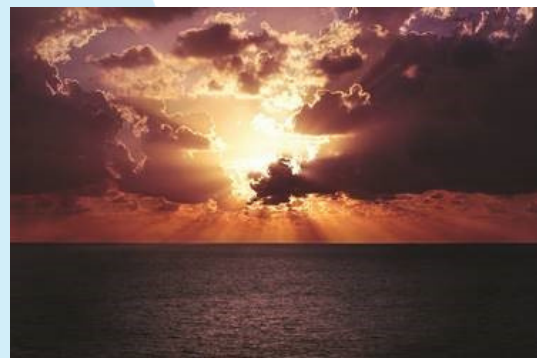

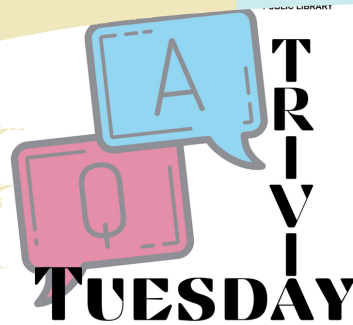

TALK ABOUT TOWN..

This is a new addition for our newsletter. An opportunity for us to highlight our local creators. For September we've got a piece written by local author, Sandra Winder.



As a Tour Guide at the Civic Centre since tours began in April 2019, I have met a lively selection of visitors from Gawler, other parts of the State, interstate and overseas. Surprise and delight are frequent reactions and I often hear remarks like:

I had no idea...., That makes me think of my (Mum, Dad, old Mrs ...), Haven't they done a great job of bringing it into the 21st century without losing the history!

Best of all is when they see the Centre as a work of art...and there is an infinite variety of types of old and new art to take in. The Town Hall and Institute are architectural colonial gems dating back to 1857 and 1871 respectively. The restoration of these iconic stone buildings retains all the character of the Victorian era at the same time as making them a lively facility to be used and enjoyed by locals and visitors from everywhere.



One of the highlights always appreciated by people is when I take them onto the balconies where they get a superb view of the many substantial 19th and early 20th century shops, banks, churches, monuments and parks along Murray Street and adjacent areas. We step out onto one of the balconies from the James Martin Room, which features a number of portraits of local identities by the 19th century artist Andrew McCormac, whose finely detailed works can also be seen at the Art Gallery of South Australia, Parliament House and the Northern Territory Museum of Arts Gallery and Museum.

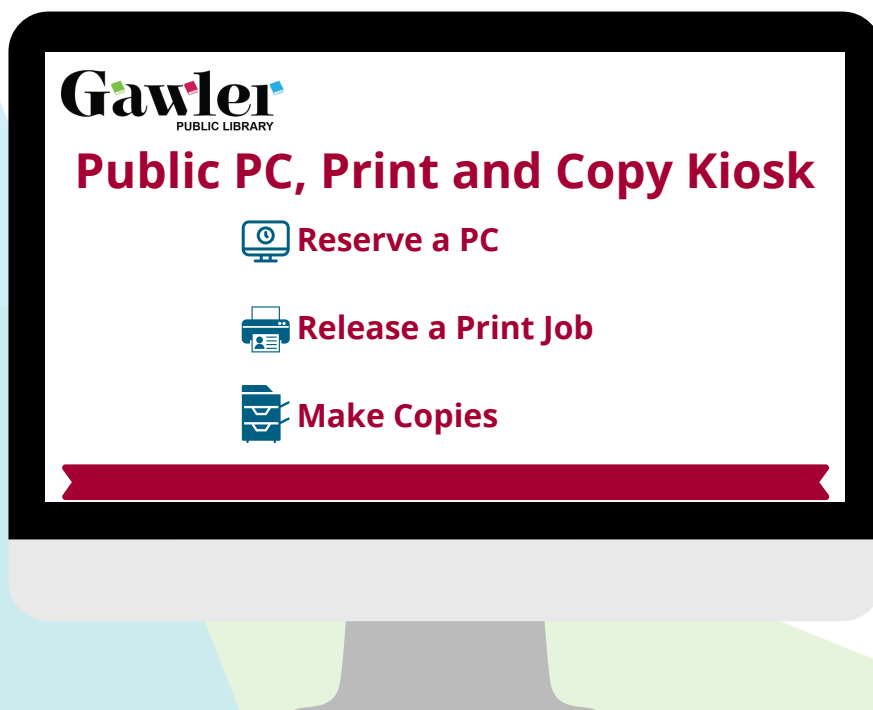
One of the most popular highlights of a tour is the Heritage Gallery in the old Council Chamber with its spectacular decorative ceiling. When I guide visitors into the latest exhibition, I often hear a surprised: "Oh. I had no idea this was here. What a great use of the space." The inaugural exhibition, "Into the Light", was a long-awaited opportunity for me to help others discover the 40,000 plus years of Kurna history and to welcome them onto Kurna land with the words Niina Marni. Gawler Civic Centre Kurna Yartangka Yuwanthi. Welcome. Gawler Civic Centre stands on Kurna land. These are just a few of the reasons visitors join a tour of the Civic Centre. There are so many stand-outs such as the Cultural Heritage Research Centre, the Youth Space, the magnificent Honour Rolls in the Walk of Honour remembering the valiant service of Gawler men and women....and the list goes on.



TECH TIPS

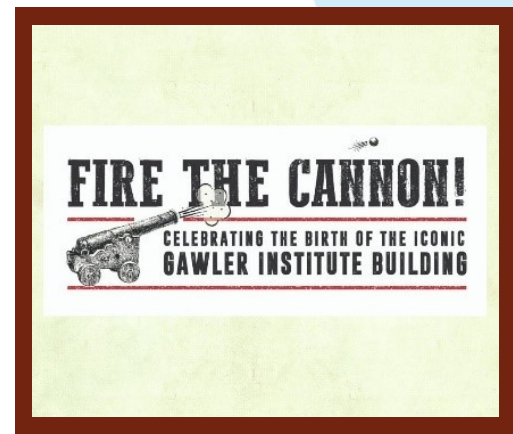


Item Highlight:

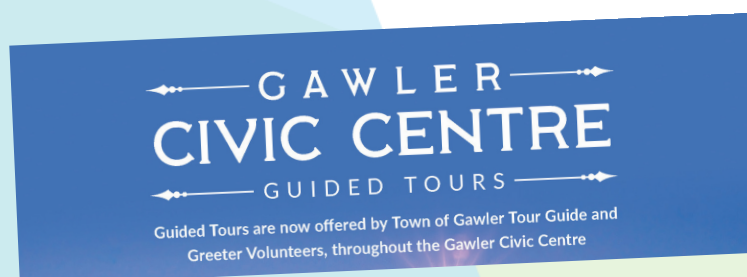

The Kadlitiya Yarning Circles are a local approach to keeping these important conversations going.

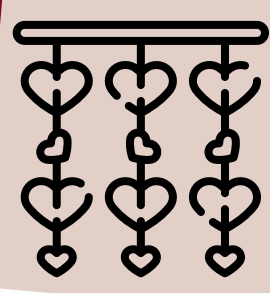
Kids Create



17 MOBILE

Make a mobile as a lovely decoration for your bedroom. Cut out circles of paper, using old magazines or wrapping paper and stick them together, threading a length of wool through the middle of them, then tie the decorations onto a twig or branch. Hang your mobile above your bed so that you can watch it while you snooze.

- Materials**
- Old magazines
 - Scrap of cardboard
 - Something round to draw around to make a template (2 sizes)
 - Pen
 - Scissors
 - Wool
 - Twig



68 RECYCLING

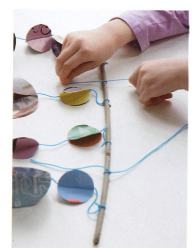
1 Draw 2 circles of different sizes using any round object on a sheet of cardboard and cut them out. We used a glass for the large circle and a small jar for the smaller one. Cut out 1 circle in each size.

2 Draw around the circles on pictures in an old magazine, looking for nice colors, funny images, or interesting shapes, and cut them out.

3 Fold 2 of the circles cut out of the magazines in half and glue them together.

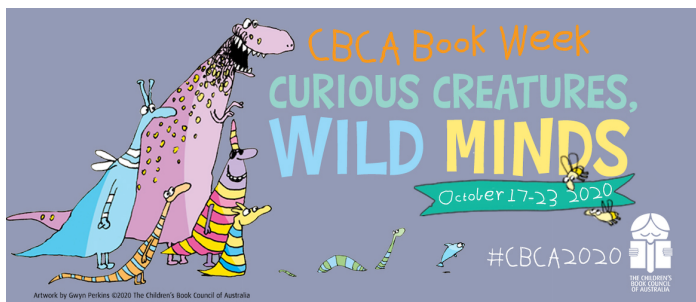
4 Open out 1 side of the pair of circles. Fold a third circle in half and glue 1 side of it down next to the first folded circle. Repeat until you have lots of groups of small and large circles.

5 Take a length of wool and lay it between the 2 open semicircles of paper. Glue one semicircle and press the other down so that the wool is stuck along the center. Glue more circles onto each length of wool until you have about 6 on each strand. Make 4 lengths in all.
